Black Votes Matter By Donna Leet

My first job after college was Executive Director of the YWCA at the University of Wisconsin Madison. In 1965, I was requested by the National Board of the YWCA to direct a Spring Break voter registration project in the black community of Raleigh, NC. The 22 students primarily came from colleges in the Northeastern United States. One student was the son of Cashmere Yost, delegate to the U.N., who called me to give details of the work we had planned and the assurance that we would be safe.

Our mission was to register voters by going house to house in black neighborhoods from 5 to 9 o'clock every evening. When we arrived, I thought things would be in order so that we could get started right away because there had been another group of students in Raleigh the week before. That was not the case, however; they had spent the week getting permits and paperwork done so that the registrations would be accepted and the votes counted. I contacted the local alderman to assist us with the completion of all the red tape so we could get started. This used up valuable time, but we used that time to do some training on how to make contacts effectively and assure that all forms were filled out correctly. After a couple days, we got started with the visits.

While we were working on all of this, a local radio station was running a live call-in program with callers harassing us. They accused us of being Northerners coming down to disrupt their elections, sleep with black women, vote illegally etc. etc. It was awful, and had been going on for days. The students were becoming frightened and so was I. So, I decided that I had to get this stopped for the safety of the students and the credibility of the project. I called the radio host and asked him to please stop taking calls on this topic. There was a long silence, and then he said, "okay." I thanked him and he kept his word. Sometimes you just have to ask for what you want.

About the third evening, we actually started to get out into the community and knock on doors. We found a great deal of fear on the part of potential voters. Some refused for fear of repudiation from employers or friends. However, we did register ~70 new voters. The students were very responsible & helpful when asked to do things. They were committed to doing all they could to assure that black voters were represented in the electoral process.

All during this week, I was being harassed by the Alderman for sexual favors. Every day the offers were different & more & more bold, He thought that I owed him this. I was 24 years old, newly married, my husband was in Basic Training in San Antonio. I had no interest whatsoever in this 50-something man. He kept insisting I go with him to Washington D.C. for the weekend. Finally, I agreed he should pick me up—about 2 hours after my plane left for Wisconsin!

When I got home, I got harassing phone calls after the Madison paper published an article about the Project. I finally called the police and was told to click the receiver twice very quickly, then say, "Officer, this is the call to trace for the police." That worked; even though it does nothing, it scared them off. I still do this to get rid of unwanted calls sometimes. Later, I served a two-year term representing on the National Board of the YWCA in New York City, representing student leadership.
